## **Old Timers Banquet to Feature Dwight 'Doc' Gooden**

**Cy Young Winner in 1985**

NASHVILLE, TN – January 24, 2011 - Former Major League player 'Doc' Gooden will be the featured speaker at the 2011 Old Timers annual banquet, scheduled for Friday, January 28th at the Millennium Maxwell House, 2025 Rosa L. Parks Blvd.

Beginning his professional career in Kingsport, Tennessee as a New York Mets farmhand, Gooden was Rookie of the Year in 1984 and an All-Star with the Mets in 1984, 1985, 1986 and 1988. He was the Cy Young winner in 1985.

Author Billy Staples (*Before the Glory* and *BillyBall 2009*) will interview Gooden and add a few stories about some of the Hall of Famers he has interviewed.

Nashville Sounds player of the year Luis Cruz will be recognized, along with local amateur MVPs and World Series Champions will be recognized. Scholarship award recipients will also be announced.
